PUBLIC COMMENT	There was no public comment			
FISCAL REPORT	Auditors Report: Dave Hoagland of CliftonLarsonAllen presented the financial statement and auditor's findings report for year ending June 30, 2018. Dave gave an explanation of how the employee pension liability is calculated. Dave reported that the income statement has a positive balance which is good despite all the changes. Members discussed details of the new building funding/status. Dave pointed out that MCCFL will need to monitor federal funding amounts to determine whether an A133 audit is required. Dave stated that from a business perspective there are no financial concerns. Dave reported that previous employee credentials/passwords need to be removed sooner when they depart to eliminate possible access potential. Dave suggested changes

There were no questions or concerns from members.</p> <p>November Financials: Mel presented the financials giving detailed information for causes for differences in both income and expenses between budget to actual. Mel pointed out the additional expenses incurred for repairs to the Hood River building. Mel stated that the end result shows a net income compared to the budgeted net loss that can be attributed to a gain in projected revenues, and decreased personnel cost.</p>			
WEBSITE PRESENTATION	<p>Barb introduced, and praised Jenn for her work on the website. Jenn reported receiving praise from Providence for providing the agency staff contact list with extension numbers on the website. Jen presented the new and improved website to members starting with the staff contact page and demonstrating the search ability and ease of locating individuals. Jenn reported that Providence also appreciated that all the intake documents are now available on the website. Jenn continued to present the entire website with a series of questions and answers. Jenn mentioned that she was considering adding a webmaster link at the bottom for submitting feedback on the site, and members agreed that the link would be a good addition. Barb reported that there was a website advisory committee that included both staff & consumers who met several times to help create the style and content of the site. Members discussed the 2-1-1 Directory and the OCH community resources page links on the site. Barb reported that the goal would be to get links to Trauma Informed Care, The Gorge Resiliency Network, and Suicide Prevention. Jenn reported that the next step on the location page will be to gain access to google maps for actual directions vs. the current map. Members viewed the employment section and Al recommend that the NHSC link be added in the why you should work at MCCFL section. Barb suggested that signs be added in the lobbies to advertise the website. Commissioner Hege asked if the site had been tested with clients for feedback, and Barb suggested that the cottage clients be utilized for such testing. EXECUTIVE DIRECTORS REPORT	<p>PacificSource Contract Update: Barb reported that there is current negotiations taking place but does not expect any immediate changes due to an auto renewal through March. Discussion have included exploring alternative payment models to include reducing risk, and ability to co-manage other higher levels of care. SUBJECT: Agency Turnover and Recruitment Data, 2018

The following report summarizes turnover and recruitment data for the 2018 calendar year. I hope you find it helpful.

MCCFL processed 33 employment separations in 2018; this translates into a raw separation turnover rate of 24%. Six of those separations, however, were layoffs resulting from programs that moved to the oversight of other employers. Excising those layoffs from the data results in an adjusted turnover rate of 20%; this is more representative of actual turnover and it is also consistent with last year's rate of 21%.

In addition to the six aforementioned layoffs, there were two retirements, one involuntary termination and 24 voluntary separations. MCCFL's average number of employees in 2018 dropped from 140 to 135; our current employee count is 130.

The length of service for worker separations (layoffs not considered) ranged from one day to 21 years, resulting in an average of 4.7 years of service. Measured at the median, the length of service is 3.1 years. This roughly consistent with last year's measurements (4.85 years @ average and 2.7 years @ median).

Turnover in the Mental Health Specialist classification improved in 2018, down from 12 in 2017 to 8 in 2018 (two of which were retirements). Mental Health Specialists represent 16% of our workforce positions, and 21% of the separations in 2018 were in that classification. 2017 stats were 20% and 40%, respectively.

Our department opened and closed 38 recruitments in 2018, only one less than in 2017. While the number of recruitments were almost identical, it is important to note that we received and processed 44% fewer applications in 2018. This strongly indicates a dwindling pool of available workers as our sourcing strategies have remained consistent. (The national unemployment rate remains below 4%.) This year we created more specialized "marketing-type" job announcements that featured our Agency and the natural beauty of the local area. We have, for the most part, been successful in filling positions though we have to work a little harder to be attractive to applicants and also be more patient in getting positions filled.

Though it is difficult to quantify, a delayed hire does have a ripple effect in the Agency as workers must pick up the extra work created by a vacancy. Supervisors and managers bear the brunt of this, but it does affect everyone. Further, in late 2016 I analyzed the cost of filling, hiring and orienting a representative position classified at Range 10 of our pay plan. The cost for that year amounted to roughly 15% of the annual salary for the position; I feel confident this percentage has not decreased.

Finally, we are experiencing a phenomenon commonly referred to as “ghosting.” Applicants may progress through interviews and background checks (or may even have accepted a job offer) only to later decline the position because they have received better/different offers or because their interest has waned. While it is by no means a regular occurrence, this has happened often enough at MCCFL that it is no longer surprising. We currently have open recruitments for eight regular positions; several of them continue to be challenging for us to fill.
